## SPEED WATCH

At the recent public meeting many parishioners raised concerns about the excessive speed of traffic on roads in the parish and as a result the Council has had discussions with the police and the Safer Road Partnership. A request has been made to have action taken on most of the roads leading into Shawbury Village. We have been informed that the Safer Road Partnership will gather speed data on the various roads and then decide on the most appropriate action, which could result in the use of the Speed Enforcement Van; traffic management or the use of Community Speed Watch.

Community Speed Watch is a project which involves volunteers carrying out speed checks on identified roads. The scheme requires at least six volunteers who, after a police vetting process, will receive training in the way to carry out checks and use the radar equipment.

The volunteers notify the Safer Neighbourhood team of the date they intend to operate and send details of offending vehicles to the Safer Road Partnership who will dispatch a letter to the vehicle's registered keeper.

With regard to problems in White Lodge Park, Shropshire Council have been asked to provide painted 20mph warning signs on the roads through the estate to ensure that drivers are aware of the new speed restriction.
